ROMAC Stands for Rotary Overseas Medical Aid for Children and was begun by Barrie Cooper from the Rotary Club of Bendigo in 1985.

Basically this allows overseas children who have in their own countries no hope of ever having a life restoring or dignity restoring operation to come to Australia (most major city hospitals will carry out this type of operation) have the operation and return to their own country.

Most operations cost money probably up to A\$50,000 depending on operation.

This needs to be raised by donation. Surgeons operate and quite often nurses provide labour free of charge however, hospitals are cash strapped by State Governments and are not in a position to provide hospital accommodation free of charge. We were shown many examples of the type of work carried out by ROMAC and many questions were asked.

Barry Thompson commented and said that this type of project is what Rotary is all about and we need more publicity for this.

Kevin Bouffler presented the traditional boomerang with the message come back
